
Authority, Relatedness, and the Unconscious in Groups and Social Systems

Dear Prospective Member:

Al technology is growing ever more sophisticated and omnipresent, perhaps, in part, because the only way to thrive in the current world we have created is to be less human and more robotic. If we were all perfectly programmed machines perhaps the challenges of these times would be mundane. Yet, as beautifully flawed people we can engage in our society and with each other with excitement, energy, anxiety, insight, grief, hope, fear, love, – with the full and wondrous range of human emotion – if we choose.

Groups and group dynamics affect our sense of self, our connections and disconnections to each other and to the systems we create together. In the temporary experiential learning environment of this conference, we have the opportunity to experience in-vivo how unconscious processes affect how authority is formed and taken up within groups and social systems. We can study how the exercise of this authority affects our sense of relatedness to and within groups and social systems. Members may use this conference to explore the power of groups to motivate and to enervate, to wound and to heal, to inspire and to challenge. We can explore how to identify implicit social contracts (rules and norms), to understand group roles including the idea of "person-in-role." We have the opportunity to study leadership, membership, individual and collective responsibility, working across boundaries, the interplay of social identity in every aspect of group life, the meaning we make of our actions, relationships, and systems-as-a-whole. At its best, this type of experiential learning enables us to develop new insights, perspectives, and actions we can bring to all the organizations we touch in our daily lives. As human beings we are not well-oiled machines, programmed to be bug-free, but we can be compassionate, capable, constant learners continuously working to understand who we are and what we can create together.

Primary Task:


The primary task is to study the inter-personal, group-as-a-whole, inter-group, and organizational dynamics as they occur in the here-and-now of the conference
