

Dear prospective member:

There are currently major challenges to the status quo of societal roles, norms, values, attitudes, and institutions on every level- personal, interpersonal, local, regional, national, international, and global. In the wake of these challenges, conflict has occurred on increasingly bifurcated grounds: us vs. them, in vs. out, new vs. old, status quo vs. change, good vs. bad, liberal vs. conservative, binary gender (male/female) vs. fluid/multiple genders (transgender/gender non-conforming), individual vs. the collective or the state, haves vs. have nots, globalization vs. nationalism, citizen vs. immigrant, nation vs. nation, ideology vs. ideology. All one has to do is turn on any news program to hear, see, and feel the divides and uncertainty that predominates much of current modern life.

The sense that this is a global phenomenon may suggest that there are group dynamics and processes that connect or disconnect all of us. If so, how do we understand these dynamics and processes? How were they formed? How are they part of collective unconscious processes? What function are they serving for us? What roles do we play in them? And who ends up acting them out on our behalf?

This conference will explore the conscious and unconscious group processes by which we form and confer authority and leadership on others, how we take up and use or abdicate our own personal authority and leadership, and the potential social, political, and emotional consequences related to these processes. This exploration may assist us in understanding the current global condition, how these dynamics affect us personally, and how our daily roles, beliefs, and attitudes are determined by them.

Primary Task

The primary task is to study the intra- and inter-personal, inter-group, and group-as-a-whole dynamics as they unfold in the here-and-now of the conference as a temporary organization within its context.

Conference Design and Role of Staff

The conference is designed as a temporary organization with the primary task of providing opportunities for learning. It is not about teaching in conventional ways. Staff manage the conference boundaries, but they do not manage people. They will be observing, interpreting, reflecting on and making sense of the various groups' experiences, as well as their own, including those that are hidden and sometimes unconscious.
